Expenses: 2018 Projection / 2019 Budget





THE FARM GROUP

All residents are welcome at all farm events at any time.

Members who volunteer for at least 2 hours a week are offered a share of the weekly harvest.

As of October 15th farm volunteers have donated 1,971 hours of time.

FARM AND COMMUNITY

- Rhubarb donated to DCHS farmhouse opening day.

- Hosted the first annual Pumpkin Smashing event as a fundraiser for DCHS.
- Hosted a tour and pumpkin picking for HSES kindergarten students. Also, donated pumpkins and corn stalks to the school for various classroom projects.
- Smart Start preschool students were regular visitors at the farm.
- Donated surplus produce to the Idaho food Bank and Garfield Elementary School food pantry.



2019

- The farm is an amenity for Hidden Springs residents, rooted in our founding principals and continues the 150 year old farming tradition in the Dry Creek Valley.
- 2019 marks the fourth year of farm under the current model decisions made by active members of the farm group supported by the HSTA.
- Working with Fish and Game to identify deer fencing options to reduce crop loss.
- Implementing a three year crop rotation for areas infested with pests on the advice of Ada County Extension.
- Recruiting farm apprentices to learn essential tasks for the long term sustainability of the farm.
- Idaho Botanical Garden will showcase the community farm in their 2019 Garden Tour.
- Continue to expand u-pick.
