Hidden Springs Town Association as of August 31, 2021 YTD









- ☐ Assessments 110% of budget: higher than budget due to 4Q20 fees collected in Jan 21, billing delay
- ☐ Transfer fee income 292% of budget
- ☐ Set-Up fee 141% of budget
- ☐ Barn/Clubhouse rentals 278% of budget

Expenses under budget at 93%: \$702,822 actual vs. \$755,880 budget

- ☐ Open Space & Site Repairs under budget partially due to timing of projects
- ☐ Community Programs at 81% of budget, held over materials/deposits
- ☐ Admin at 115% of budget largely due to legal expenses
- ☐ Capital expenditures at about \$112,332 YTD; \$236,000 budgeted in 2021

Expenses under budget at 77%: \$431,177 actual vs. \$557,378 budget



Purpose of a Reserve Fund

- Provide for unexpected expenses and large-scale maintenance and upgrades
- Protect the association from financial default
- Avoid significant annual fluctuations in dues
- Apply a long-term planned approach





Purpose of a Reserve Fund

- The more financially significant the assets, the higher the reserve fund amount necessary
- Asset condition and age and immediacy of need affect the reserve fund amount
- Reserve can be funded by annual excess carryover or planned budget
- Best approach is a planned approach based on asset analysis
- 2021 reserve study conducted for HSTA and HSSC



Reserve Study Financial Plan

- Physical inspection included items that have a remaining useful life of less than 30 years and value greater than approximately \$5,000
- A 3% inflation rate is assumed
- Goal is to keep reserve balance above a percent funded amount
 - HSSC planned for 70% threshold funding
 - HSTA planned for 50% threshold funding



Reserve Study Assessment

Funding Assessment

Based on a 30 year cash flow projection

- HSSC: Reserves appear inadequately funded and increased contributions and/or assessments are needed to meet future expenditures.
- HSTA: Reserves appear well funded and modest contribution increases are needed every 3 years.

Path to Execution

- Step 1 The Art of the Possible: Community Survey
 - 140 residents participated in the survey
 - Survey results available at <u>www.hiddensprings.com</u> on the News from HSTA page
- Step 2 Town Council to Discuss Survey Results
 - Discuss and determine next steps
 - Likely compile results and present as a community vote.



Path to Execution

- Step 3 Final Opportunity for Community Input
 - Resident vote on projects with Town Council 2022 Election ballot
- Step 4 Execution
 - Based on results, Town Council will review the top projects with staff and enter the research phase
 - Potentially form resident committees
 - Budgets
 - Schedules

Open Space Etiquette

Hidden Springs includes \$10 acres of dedicated open space in the Dry Creek Valley for its residents to enjoy. Observing a few rules of etiquette can keep our open spaces a pleasant place for all of us. KEEP IT CLEAN

- · Carry your litter with you until you reach a trash can.
- · Help out, by picking up a bit of litter on each walk.
- · Participate in community clean-ups.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR DOGS

- . Leash dogs in all the open spaces in the valley, or in developed areas of the foothills.
- · Always control you dog and do not let it harass people or wildlife.
- Be sure to take a plastic bag with you to clean up after your dog. Cleanup is required by the Hidden Springs CC&Rs.
- Watch for signs some locations are off-limits to dogs in the spring to protect bird nesting activity. Dogs are not permitted in the Hidden Springs Drive Westland and Wildlife Preserve from March through June.

HIKERS AND BIKERS

- Stay on the trails.
- . Only use foothills and valley trails when they are not muddy or wet, to prevent erosion.
- · Respectfully share the trails with other users.
- . Bicyclists slow to a walking pace when passing, and always control your bike.
- Give animals extra room and time to adjust to you. When passing horses use special care and follow directions from the riders.
- · Leave gates as you found them, or as marked.
- Observe the signs bicycles are not permitted on some trails.

MOTORIZED VEHICLES

- Motorized off-road vehicles are not permitted in any Hidden Springs open space areas.

PLANTS AND WILDLIFE

- Leave plants and wildlife in the wild for all to appreciate and enjoy.
- . Do not dump yard waste or animal waste into open space areas.
- Do not plant or landscape in open space, or place wildlife house or feeders without authorization.

Help Protect Our Sewer System!

FLUSH only the three 'P's' down the toilet - Pee, Poop & toilet Paper. Throw trash into a waste bin or recycle it — don't put it down the drain! Keep fats, oils and grease (FOG) out of your kitchen sink! When poured down the drain, FOG can build up in pipes and equipment and cause significant problems in the sewer system and wastewater treatment plant. Hazardous chemicals (i.e., garden pesticides, automotive fluids) should be disposed of at the Hidden Hollow Landfill or a mobile collection site.

Clogged pipes and pumps cost money to repair. In the case of lift station pumps, clogged pumps require significant maintenance to ensure the pumps are working properly. If they can't be repaired, they must be replaced, which costs even more money. The solution to this expensive problem is to make sure that only toilet paper is flushed down the toilet!

What's NOT Flushable?

The following items don't break down like toilet paper and clog household pipes, sewer lift station pumps, and cause sewer backups onto streets, businesses, and homes.

- O Diapers (cloth, disposable, "flushable
- Hair
- Toilet Bowl Scrub Pads
- Cleaning Wipes of
 ANY Kind
 (Baby wipes, disinfectant
 wipes, moist wipes etc.)
- Flushable Wipes Though advertised as "safe for septic systems/sewer," flushable wipes cause problems for wastewater treatment operators.

- Wash Cloths, Towels, Rags
- O Dental Floss
- Nitty Litter
- Napkins, Paper Towels (Paper or cloth)
- Sanitary Napkins, Tampons, Condoms
 Any non-organic materia
- Facial Tissues, Cotton Balls, Swabs and Pads



Safety

- . Do not swim in the ponds
- Do not drink the reclaimed water. Reclaimed water is the recycled wastewater from the Hidden Springs Sewer which has been treated to remove solids and certain impurities, disinfected and then discharged to irrigate the common areas. Not intended for consumption.
- Do not climb the fences around the sewer ponds or allow your pets insidethe fence
- Do not let your children or pets run through the

To help minimize the contact between effluent water and the residents of Hidden Springs the HSTA attempts to irrigate as much as possible between the hours of 8.00pm and 6.00am. However some areas like the farm lands and the orchard may be irrigated during the daytime hours in which case the residents are asked to avoid contact with the effluent water during the application times.
